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## Advances in Cancer Screening

**A talk in English by Prof. Jean-Bernard Dubois, *President of la Ligue contre le cancer (Comité de l'Hérault) and former onco-radiologist and Director at ICM (Institut du Cancer de Montpellier)***

The significant improvement in cancer prognosis over recent years can be attributed to two main factors: advancements in treatment and earlier diagnosis through widespread screening.

The four main cancers for which screening is particularly effective are: breast, uterine cervix, colorectal and prostate cancers.

In this video talk, which is delivered in English, Prof. Dubois discusses cancer screening and takes questions from the audience.

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## French National Cancer Plan 2021-2030

Video-conference at the National Cancer Institute (Institut National du Cancer, INCa), on February 4<sup>th</sup>, World Cancer Day (Extract from a report written by Cat Hartley)

"Cancer rates have fallen over the last five years and outcomes are better." This was Professor Norbert Ifrah's opening statement at this video conference. He pointed out that a great deal has been achieved in terms of cancer prevention and improved screening but there is still much to be done, in particular, after-care to help people living with cancer.

Dr Douglas Lowry, an American cancer specialist, said "France has an outstanding record for cancer research [...]the nationally coordinated system of cancer care and research is exceptional."

After a panel discussion by 4 specialists and a representative of a patients' association and a Q&A session, President Macron outlined the strategic ambitions over the next 10 years in a filmed presentation.:

- greater research innovation
- 20% more finance (1,74 billion euros over 10 years to be rapidly available over the next 5 years)
- objectives to reduce deaths from 150,000 to 100,000 per year (there are currently 380,000 new cancer cases every year)

This will be achieved by:

- **Increased prevention.** 40% of all cancers can be avoided, but prevention is one of the weak points in the French system. Tobacco accounts for 70,000 new cases of cancer each year. Excessive alcohol consumption accounts for 1/5 of all cases. We need to develop more hygienic lifestyles including improved nutrition (using, for example, the Nutriscore\*\* labels on food products), increased physical activity especially at school and improvements to the air that we breathe. (7 new low emissions zones being developed).
- **Better screening**, especially for colorectal cancers which are underused. (7 out of 10 people eligible for colorectal screening do not do the test.) ; inventing and improving tomorrow's screening tests ; the use of big data to analyse results from large numbers of patients, for example, and the reading of diagnostic scans using artificial intelligence.
- **Improved support for patients and their families during and after**

**cancer.** Faster implementation of research results and greater awareness of the long-term effects of living with cancer. More research and acceleration of the use of biotherapies, immunotherapies and genome therapies which cause less long-term collateral damage

- **The after-effects of cancer.** Living a long time with the after-effects of cancer must be taken into account. The “*droit à l’oubli*” (right to forget) has been a major step but does not go far enough. 20% of cancer patients do not get their jobs back.

The fight against cancer is a European fight with all forces united to achieve progress. Special funding will be allocated to children’s cancers where the cure rate is now 80% with 1,700 new cases in France every year. He stressed the importance that cancer treatments are free in France and thanked all those involved in treatment, care and research.

In closing, a different panel of experts and a patient representative welcomed the 10 year plan. There was general agreement that this was an ambitious project, resulting from two citizens’ consultations and many consultations with researchers, clinicians and patients.

There is still a need to improve cancer care throughout the country as there are large discrepancies between areas. The overall objectives are ambitious, with 234 new measures to be undertaken, including 1 million new cancer screenings every year, reducing by 60,000 the number of new treatable cancer cases throughout metropolitan France and its overseas territories.

\*\* Nutri-Score is a front-of-pack nutritional label which converts the nutritional value of food and beverages into a simple overall score. It is based on a scale of 5 colours and letters (A is green to represent the best nutritional quality while E is dark orange to show it’s the lowest). More information is available [here](#).

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## Raising Awareness about Cancer during the Covid-19 pandemic

Professor Axel Khan, President of La Ligue contre le cancer and renowned geneticist, has been particularly active in alerting the French government and the general population about the situation concerning actual and future cancer diagnoses and treatments throughout the past year of the Covid-19 crisis. A regular participant in French television debates, he has stressed the need for people to continue keeping their appointments for regular screening tests, particularly mammograms, smear tests for cervical cancer, PSA blood tests for prostate cancer, colorectal tests etc. and to not ignore health warnings that may need a rapid diagnosis.

Many people have avoided doctors’ surgeries and hospital services by fear of contamination from the coronavirus, leaving diagnosis later than usual and hence potentially involving the delayed onset of treatment should it be needed.

La Ligue contre le cancer has greatly improved its communication, with a participative website called Parlons Ligue and an enhanced attempt at interaction with the general population, covering important issues such as new

advances in treatments, screening campaigns and information about Covid testing and vaccination for those undergoing cancer treatments. There are discussion forums, witness statements from patients and carers and useful information about new treatment and screening campaigns. Information (in French) about Parlons Ligue is [here](#).

Axel Khan has also been active in asking for donations for continuing research into cancer diagnosis and treatment, particularly as the usual fund-raising events have not been possible due to restrictions on meetings and events.

He recently launched a particular appeal to support research into children's cancers, which although rare, require a special input involving maintaining of social and educational contacts and transferring innovative therapies from adults to children and young people, particularly new advances in immunotherapy.

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## **What's New in the World of Cancer Research?**

### [CT scan catches 70% of lung cancers at early stage, NHS study finds](#)

Thousands of lives could be saved if people at risk of developing Britain's deadliest cancer were screened to diagnose it before it becomes incurable, a major NHS study has found. Giving smokers and ex-smokers a CT scan uncovers cancerous lung tumours when they are at an early enough stage so they can still be removed, rather than continuing to grow unnoticed, it shows.

### [Ionic liquid uniformly delivers chemotherapy to tumours while destroying cancerous tissue](#)

Vascular and interventional radiologists report the development of a new ionic liquid formulation that killed cancer cells and allowed uniform distribution of a chemotherapy drug into liver tumours and other solid tumours in the lab. This discovery could solve a problem that has long plagued drug delivery to tumours.

### [An end to invasive biopsies? Researchers advance simple and inexpensive diagnostic blood test](#)

Researchers have found a less invasive and more accurate options for diagnoses using a simple blood test that detects DNA fragments.

### [Reviving exhausted immune cells to fight cancer. Removing a key gene could help T cells effectively attack solid tumours](#)

Eliminating a single gene can turn exhausted cancer-fighting immune cells known as CD8+ T cells back into refreshed soldiers that can continue to battle malignant tumours, a new study suggests. The findings could offer a new way to harness the body's immune system to attack cancers.

### ['Achilles' heel' of cancer cells revealed. Research could lead to development of future drugs to eliminate the cells](#)

A new study shows, for the first time, how an abnormal number of chromosomes (aneuploidy) -- a unique characteristic of cancer cells that researchers have known about for decades -- could become a weak point for these cells. The study could lead to the development of future drugs that will use this vulnerability to eliminate the cancer cells.

### [Genetic changes in tumours could help predict if patients will respond to immunotherapy](#)

Researchers have identified genetic changes in tumours which could be used to predict if immunotherapy drugs would be effective in individual patients.

### [Cancer research expands body's own immune system to kill tumours. Scientists are working to expand the way they have made immune cells fight tumours from a small handful of cancers to a wide array of them](#)

Scientists are hoping advances in cancer research could lead to a day when a patient's own immune system could be used to fight and destroy a wide range of tumours. Cancer immunotherapy has some remarkable successes, but its effectiveness has been limited to a relatively small handful of cancers.

Researchers describe how advances in engineering models of tumours can greatly expand cancer immunotherapy's effectiveness to a wider range of cancers.

### [Toward a disease-sniffing device that rivals a dog's nose](#)

A new system can detect the chemical and microbial content of an air sample with even greater sensitivity than a dog's nose. Researchers coupled this to a machine-learning process that can identify the distinctive characteristics of the disease-bearing samples.

### **'The Children of Jocasta' by Natalie Haynes (2017)**

Natalie Haynes has a passionate love of the classics, and I just wish I had had someone like her as my History teacher at school. She weaves stories from the classics into a vividly fresh reality, enjoying giving the spotlight to some of the lesser characters. In this book, she takes a fresh perspective on an ancient story, reimagining how the Oedipus and Antigone stories would look if the often-overlooked female characters took centre stage. I read this book soon after the first Lockdown began last year, and I was especially gripped by the description of the plague that hit Thebes, as I realised that we were experiencing a modern-day equivalent!

### **'Holding' by Graham Norton (2016)**

This is Graham Norton's first novel, and I think astonished all who first read it, as it shows a completely different side to this popular chat-show host and actor. He is a real writer, and he breathes life into a cast of characters living in a sleepy town in West Cork, Ireland. He writes with pathos and empathy, whilst managing a delicate characterisation spiced with a gentle and understanding humour.

This small town is just going through its usual daily life until the discovery of human bones unearthed during re-development. Enter the bumbling Sergeant P.J. Collins, who now finds himself having to sort through decades of gossip and secrets to solve a mysterious crime....

A couple of quotes, to give you a taste of Norton's writing:

"A limp spring onion draped itself over the edge of the wicker basket that displayed the fresh produce in the O'Driscolls' shop, Cafe and Post Office. It shared the space with a shrivelled red pepper, while the basket above it held a few sweaty-looking bags of carrots. On the ground was a large sack of potatoes. Brown paper bags dangled from string to allow eager shoppers to make their own selection from the enticing display."

And:

"She felt like she needed to anchor herself to something or she might fly around the room screaming out her pain like a hysterical balloon."
