

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WALK THE REGION

This circular walk through terraced vineyards in the foothills of Mount Canigou is the region's one and only 'Oenorandonnée', (wine walk) awarded by the Fédération Française de Randonnée (French hiking federation) to circular walks that set off and arrive back at a wine cellar.

The labelled circuit starts (and ends) at the Cave de Terrats in the heart of the Aspres. What better way to follow fresh air and good healthy exercise than a tasting of this excellent and well priced wine? It would practically be rude not to!

DID YOU KNOW....

...that "Aspres" means "poor" or "arid" in Catalan, although the regional wines are anything but!



Easy to moderate 2h - 7,7 km 185 m altitude Clearly marked with yellow and white markers.

GETTING THERE

Heading from **Perpignan** towards **Le Boulou** on the D900, turn off onto the D612 at Mas Sabole, direction Thuir. Carry on for around 5km and left turn for Terrats. The winery is on the right, easily recognisable by its 'Tour Bouteillé', the only three storied wine tower in France.

Parking Park in Terrats winery car park or nearby.





Start in front of the Tour Bouteillé and take 1st street on left, following the signs.



Turn right, exit the village, and continue into vineyards.

Cross the River Canterrane (meaning frog song). Gold was

once mined in this river. Have a paddle and grab anything glittering in the sunshine. You may even find prospectors sifting through the riverbed for 'paillettes d'or' To your right, you will see the 'Roc de Mallorque' overlooking the plain.

Turn left by the shepherd's hut ('cortal' in Catalan), and continue straight ahead, ignoring path on right.

Follow the signs, turning left after the loop, by some ruined cottages.

More than just a Restaurant!

CORTAL

This Catalan word describes the stone sheep shelters of the Conflent region, built in village or pasture, often large enough to shelter both the sheep and the shepherd.

As the building of these stone sneeprolus required hundreds of tons of stone and skilled masons to carry out the work, they tended to be financed and owned by wealthy farmers.



Cross the **River Canterrane** again via a new crossing, and walk along the gardens, until you reach Terrats. Stroll around the village with its romanesque church and bell tower, ice wells and ancient bread oven, before returning to the car park, just in time for a delightful wine taster in the pleasant winery.

But this is more than just a walk! **You can order** a 'Panier gourmand', from the cave, and once you've worked up an appetite (and a thirst!) the winemakers will meet you halfway with a picnic and a bottle. 10€ (reservations required)



GET LOST!

Walk and wine for the big kids, then how about games around the water and flower mazes of the Labyrinthe aux 1000 fleurs?



LES CAVES BYRRH, THUIR

Created by the Violet brothers of Corsavy in 1873, this well known aperitif is created from good quality Roussillon wines and quinine water – and said to be medicinal!

Today, not only Byrrh but Cinzano, Dubonnet, Ambassadeur and Suze are made and matured in the 600 huge oak barrels that line the chais leading to the biggest oak barrel in the world. At 10 metres high, it contains 1,000,200 litres. A fascinating guided tour takes you through the station concourse, built by Gustave Eiffel, shows you how the wines are flavoured and fortified to make the aperitifs, passes by evocative old advertising posters, and ends with a tasting.



ART & WAR

Gustave Violet, son of one of the Byrrh creators, chose not to follow in his father's footsteps. Instead, he became an artist, sculptor and architect. At the outbreak of WW1, he was conscripted. On his return in 1918 this gentle artist, totally traumatised both physically and mentally by the horrors of war, was commissioned by several of the towns of the P-O to sculpt their War Memorials. In fact, with no wish to glorify war, the monuments he created were very much depict not glory but sorrow and dispair. Other Violet memorials in Perpignan, Prades, Estagel, Tautavel and Claira, follow similar themes; women waiting for sons and lovers who would never return, the tragedy of war....

OUT for THEDAY



Perpignan is once again the proud host of the prestigious 'VISA Pour I'Image' festival, bearing witness to some of the world's biggest stories. Some made the news, others were kept quiet; images of our troubled times, the horrors of war, natural disasters...but also tales of hope and a glimpse of the quirky side of life.

From August 27 to September 11, there will be 25 free exhibitions in venues around Perpignan. There will also be 6 evening shows, with events projected on a giant screen amidst the graceful arcades of the Campo Santo, the largest and oldest funeral cloister in France.

Visit exhibitions by some of the world's leading documentary photographers, as well as up-and-coming professionals and skilled amateurs (through the "OFF" programme of fringe events in local cafés, shops and other spaces).



The photos are varied and fascinating but many of the venues are worth a visit in their own right. What a great way to explore and enjoy Perpignan, as you wander from location to location in this historic centre or take the weight off with a commented ride around town in style on the little train.



The XVI century Town Hall next to the Tourist Office in place de la Loge has three hands sprouting from the wall, representing each of the main 3 social classes, and their right to vote. Step through the attractive arched entrance into a pleasant courtyard where "La Méditerranéenne" (also known as 'La Pensée"), bronze statue by Maillol, sits in a pretty pool.



HOTEL PAMS

This art deco gem in the Rue Emile Zola is one of several beautiful old 'hotels particuliers', elegant private mansions of the Perpignan Bourgeoisie. It has enormous Art Deco Pre-Raphaelite paintings on the walls, a stunning entrance hall with an amazing light well, and a delightful hidden garden. During Visa, it is the meeting place for all the press photographers. Pop your head around the door for a glimpse of how the other half lived in Perpignan a century ago.



During the Middle Ages Perpignan was blessed with many monasteries. Almost all religious orders were well represented. Many are now used for exhibitions and concerts.

COUVENT DES MINIMES

Named after the order of 'Minimes' monks for whom it was built, you will find many award winning photos hanging on the walls of the old monk's dormitories, the grand corridors, the kitchens, the cloisters and courtyard of this the 15th century convent.

EGLISE DES DOMINICAINS

Move on to this nearby chapel, where the Visa photographs are hung on long wires in the impressive exhibition space, almost dwarfed by the height of their surroundings. Part of the Cloisters was sold to the army in the XVIII century and was, until recently, the base of the French Foreign Legion. Now, it is a venue for festivals and events.



CHAPELLE DU TIERS ORDRE

Cross a small courtyard on the Place de la Revolution Francaise to another VISA venue, full of dramatic 19th century art. The building took almost a century to complete. The notorious "Trabucayres", Catalan highwaymen who terrorised the roads of the Albères in the mid 19th century, were tried and condemned to death or hard labour here.



ANCIENNE UNIVERSITE

The XVIII century 'university' was commissioned by Marechal Mailly, commander of the Roussillon in 1760, who personally donated 20,000 books, A library, then a museum, today it is the home of the city archives.....and another venue for VISA.



LE CASTILLET

The city walls built by Vauban are long gone but this former gateway, fortress and prison is today a museum of Catalan History - and another Visa venue. Climb the spiral staircase of La Casa Pairal (entrance: 2€) to the terrace, added to support cannons. The views across the city, the plain of Roussillon, and the sacred Mount Canigou are spectacular.

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SHORT STAY VISAS:

what if you overstay your 90 days?

BREXIT, BREXIT, BREXIT!

Without residency rights, Brits with second homes, like all other third country nationals, are limited to 90 days in France (or any other EU country) over a 180-day period.



For British passport holders, the short stay (90 day) visa is automatically assigned on your arrival into the Schengen area, you do not need to apply for it in advance.

*Note: your passport must be valid for AT LEAST 3 months after the day you plan to leave.

Make sure you ask border officers to stamp your passport on arrival and departure or officials may presume you have overstayed your 90-day WELCOME

If you don't receive a stamp in your passport, keep hold of boarding cards and/or tickets as proof of your movements, particularly those applying for a visa extension in France (see below) who flew into a Spanish airport and drove over the border to France.

CALCULATORS

Keep track of your totals with the EU's short stay Schengen calculator

https://ec.europa.eu

EXTENSIONS

You can apply for a short stay visa extension if, during your trip to France, you encounter unforeseeable extenuating circumstances, humanitarian, family or professional.

Complete and send a visa extension form (demande de prolongation de visa de court séjour) to your local prefecture with details for your request, and date of departure.

INCLUDE:

- -photocopies of all pages of passport (proof of entry and exit stamps, particularly arrival onto French territory)
- -proof of insurance, including repatriation
- -evidence of the extenuating circumstances (medical certificates, professional event etc.)

*Note: you can only apply for an extension from within France. If you leave the territory, you will need to apply for a re-entry visa from the British Embassy or a long-stay visa from TLS in the UK.

OVERSTAYING

Tempted to try your luck and stay beyond the regulation 90 days? According to official websites, immigration authorities register every arrival and departure in their SIS (Système d'information Schengen) database, flagging up overstays, even just for 1 day!

Overstaying could result in immediate deportation, fines and a ban from re-entering the Schengen

The cost of the fine and the length of the ban are not set in stone but worst-case scenarios seem to indicate 1200€ and a 5 year ban.

LONGER-STAY VISAS

If you need/want to stay longer than 90 days, you will need to apply for a longer stay visa from your country of residence.

Use the French government's official visa guide (https://france-visas.gouv.fr) to check which visa you require and your eligibility.

For British residents, longer stay visas are managed by TLS, who have centres in London, Manchester and Edinburgh.

Read their step-by-step guide to the French visa application process at https://fr.tiscontact.com

A number of P-O Life readers have gone through the process and report that the overall cost per visa is around £112 (without counting the additional costs of getting to the interview etc). As with all similar application processes, the amount of paperwork can be daunting!

Ligne C1: Porté Puymorens – Puigcerdá – Mont-Louis

Ligne C2: Formiguères - Puigcerdá - Err

Ligne C3: Figueres - Le Boulou

Ligne C4: Figueres - Macanet de Cabrenys - Saint Laurent de Cerdans

Ligne C5: Camprodon - Mollo - Prats de Mollo


Lines C1, C2 and C3: lines have connections with Perpignan.

Line C4: has connections with Arles sur Tech and Perpignan.

Line C5: line has connections with Arles sur Tech. Perpignan and Ripoll.

There are also **2 long distance lines** connection Barcelone-Puigcerdà-Ilivia-Bourg-Madame and Girona-Puigcerdà-Llivia-Bourg-Madame.

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TRADITIONS

14TH JULY FETE NATIONALE

The most important holiday of the year for the French, this date celebrates the overthrowing of the monarchy and the beginning of the democratic republic.

Although we're now into the 5th version of the republic (created by De Gaulle in 1952), the storming of the Bastille on the afternoon of 14 July 1789 is still a great cause for celebration today.

Expect fireworks, music and flyovers from the Patrouille de France (14th - 15th July in Port Barcarès and 17th July in Saint Cyprien).



BOOMBANGABANG

As well as the big bank holidays, the coastal towns celebrate summer with regular firework displays. Between Argelès and Barcarès, there are explosions pretty much every week. Check out the programme online:

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CURIOUS CASE of a RET PAVEMEN

PART I

I've lived in the P-O since 2001, visiting Céret on many occasions with visitors, the market, a meal, the cherry festival, the Feria or a visit to the museum or church.

During all that time I've noticed that Céret has a penchant for digging up their roads and pavements on a regular basis. I'm not sure if they have ever found what they were looking for (a bit like U2), but one recent piece of pavement art attracted my attention - the pavement adjacent to the Mairie and the old tourist office where you will find an interesting commemoration to the artists that have been drawn to the area and have links to Céret and the P-0.

Of the 32 names, I knew of maybe seven or eight and some purely by seeing their names on street signs. I dug deeper. The discoveries I made were truly enlightening from a human and artistic viewpoint with many of them instigating some of the greatest art movements of our time.



Representing music, painting, sculpture, cinema, and the written word, predominately French/Spanish Catalans (but amazingly not one woman apart from the statue), their common denominator is their link to Céret and the Pvrenées-Orientales.

Quim Domene

The Céret tourist office informed me that Quim Domene, Spanish artist born in Olot, was responsible for the monument; in metal, marble, and brick, it's a work of art in itself.



(MARIE JOSEPH ALEXANDER) Deodat de Severac

Deodat is the only composer

commemorated on the monument. He was born into a noble, artistic family in Saint-Felix-Lauragais, P-O side of Toulouse. He studied in both Toulouse and Paris before moving to Céret, where he died in 1921.

Ramon Pichot

Ramon was a Spanish/Catalan painter, friend of Picasso and an early mentor to Dali. After Pichot's sudden death in 1925. Picasso included a commemoration to him in a painting he was working on at the time, namely 'The three dancers'.

Marrolo Hugue

Manolo Hugue, better known as just Manolo, was a Catalan/Spanish sculptor and part of the 20th century noucentism movement, which pushed back against modernism and avant-gardism. Although a friend of Picasso, his style was more reminiscent of another local artist. Aristide Maillol.



Frank Burty Haviland

Born in Perpignan, Haviland was a cubist painter, as well as a friend and client of both Picasso and Braque. He was an avid collector of African art, which can be seen in his own works.



Pablo Picasso

Arguable our biggest claim to fame, homegrown hero Picasso tried his hand at an astonishing array of media: painting, sculpting, collage, ceramics, theatre... He spent most of his life north of the border in France and became one of the most influential artists of the 20th century, within the cubism movement but also across the artistic spectrum. The newly reopened Musée d'art moderne in Céret houses a number of his works.



Georges Braque
A big contributor to the cubism and fauvism movements, Braque was a close friend and colleague of Picasso, so much so that it was difficult to distinguish the artists in many of their early works. Braque's quiet nature meant he was largely eclipsed by the more flamboyant Picasso.

JOSÉ VICTORIANO (Carmelo Carlos) González-Pérez

Madrid-born, Juan Gris, as he's more commonly known, spent most of his working life in France. Another big name in the cubism movement, his innovative works are among the most distinctive.





MORE TO COME IN THE NEXT EDITION

Small Céret may be, but that doesn't stop the Musée d'Art being up there with some of the national gallery greats.

The latest expo at the **Céret Musée d'Art Moderne** celebrates foreign artists on the Paris art scene of the early 20th century, particularly during the war years. Many were fleeing rising tensions, restricted freedom and persecution in their homelands. They came from Russia and Central Europe, the **Netherlands, Italy, Spain and Asia.** They mostly lived in poverty, but **found inspiration in the streets** and cafés of this 'capitale des arts' where they


forged friendships with other like-minded artists. displaying their works in the many exhibitions, art fairs, and galleries happy to welcome foreign artists.

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

When Perpignan baker Joseph Bardou made his fortune from the invention of JOB cigarette papers, his son Pierre commissioned the Danish **Architect Viggo** Dorph-Petersen, well known for his

extravagant Belle Epoque style, to build a château for each of his three children.



INGREDIENTS

- > 1/2 1 watermelon chopped up
- > mint leaves coarsely torn
- > juice of 3 freshly squeezed limes
- > light rum, such as Bacardi (to taste)
- > 1/2 cup sugar solution
- > Sprigs of mint for serving

METHOD

Mash up the mint leaves. Puree water melon. Place mashed up mint into large jug and pour in pureed watermelon, rum, and sugar solution, add lime juice and stir to combine.

Pour over ice cubes and garnish with sprigs of fresh mint and spears of watermelon. Serve ice cold.

The real paella has no chorizo - and no **seafood!** In fact, the **official paella** is made with just 10 essential ingredients: rice, water, olive oil, salt, saffron, tomato, flat beans, arrofón (beans from Valencia), chicken and rabbit.

Valencia is the undisputed home of paella, and in fact, the word itself comes from old Valencian meaning frying pan.

SEA URCHINS



Aie aie aie

If you've had the misfortune to accidentally step on a sea urchin (oursin) on bare footed paddles in the sea, you will be very aware how painful it can be. Though not actively aggressive, sea urchins have two defences to protect them from predators: long, venomous spikes that can puncture skin, and 'pedicellariae', forceps-like jaws that release venom. Ouch! However, the good news is that you can get your own back - by eating their gonads!

Rich in protein and dietary fibre, minerals, and Beta Carotene, high in Vitamins C and A, usually found in dark leafy greens, and high in omega-3 fatty acids.

ON THE ROCKS

Sea urchins have small tube feet that allow them to cling to rocks, so you'll usually find them in the shallows of rocky coastal areas. Our own 'Cote Rocheuse' from Collioure to Cerbère and beyond is a perfect hunting ground. As well as your mask, snorkel and flippers, take a knife or gloves to help pry them from the rocks. Choose those with hints of red, green or purple rather than pitch black in colour.

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DRIVE OLETTE TO LES ANGLES VIA SANSA

When the heat of the plain becomes oppressive, it's time to head up the mountain and fill your lungs with sweet fresh air.



scenery on your way up to the high cantons of the Cerdagne and Capcir, you can't beat the twistyturny road from Olette to Les Angles via Sansa. **Drive up the N16 past Prades** and **Villefranche**

de Conflent. At Olette, take the road towards Evol and turn left onto the D4. The twisting and turning begins pretty well toot sweet!



Pass the tiny chapel of Cabrils perched on a rocky out-crop above a stream of the same name, isolated farms

and breathtaking scenery on your way to the remote village of Sansa in the valley of Garrotxes, site of French resistance activity during WW2. Stretch your legs in this stone and slate village, the starting point of several great walks to the Col Sansa or the Massif of the Madres. Look out too for the 21m by 5m 'orri', ancient shepherd's hut built from dry stone and big enough to shelter 300 to 400 sheep - and one shepherd!

Continue your drive along either the D4, or the D5 which will bring you out in the high Capcir, via the Col de la Llose or the Col de Creu.

Not a drive for faint hearts, or weak tummies, but for lovers of wild and remote country, it is a joy!

GIRONA

In the last couple of years there had been a big increase in flights to Girona. No doubt passenger confidence in the Boeing 737MAX will have taken a battering after two crashes, and the type being grounded for a considerable time. To counter this Ryanair has renamed the 737-MAX8 as the 737-8200, and several are now in service, with many more to come. Subject to aircraft deliveries the number of flights listed could well change.

Ryanair have added Cork, but dropped several other destinations, including East Midlands, Edinburgh, Liverpool, Luton and Manchester.

Jet2 who suddenly found the airport two years ago once again have a whole raft of flights, but have dropped both Edinburgh and Glasgow. Bad news for Belfast is that both Jet2 and Ryanair have no plans to operate the route this year. Likewise, no plans for TUI flights from Gatwick.

PUNCTUREVINE Looks can be deceptive!

If you have ever ridden vour bike over puncturevine seeds (Croixde-Malte in French), or even worse, stepped on them with bare feet, you will understand exactly how they got their name!

Also called goat's-head thanks to the resemblance of its burrs to goats 'or bulls' heads. this annual weed is mostly found on dry or gravelly sites, such as orchards, vineyards, a tree lined path alongside the beach....



producing these unpleasant and harmful spiked seeds which are dispersed by sticking into tyres, shoes, clothing, fur, feathers and animal feet.

One plant can produce 300 to 5,000 seeds per season. If you do have them 'chez yous' wear thick gloves to pull them up, try not to shake seed heads loose and don't add them to your compost as they will probably survive to skewer you another

Don't be fooled by the pretty yellow flowers which bloom from late spring onwards; their Latin name of **Tribulus terrestris**, (a tribulation on the earth) also reminds us that looks can be deceptive.

Its Latin name of tribulus was originally associated with a spiky defence weapon used to slow the advance of troops, horses, chariots. and war elephants, and later used to repel wheeled vehicles by puncturing the tyres.

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SNAKEINTHEGRASS

Among seven species of grass snake to be found in the south of France, the largest is the couleuvre de Montpellier, whose males can measure (exceptionally) up to 2,50 meters. Newspaper 'Le Réveil Catalan' reported on 23 juin 1907 that a shepherd near Sournia village came across one of his sheep being strangled to death by an enormous 3 metre

long 'couleuvre' or grass snake. Unable to save the poor beast, he nevertheless went back a few days later with a gun and killed it. Calmez-vous! **Grass snakes** of this size are very rare in this

region.



LA STATUE DU PETIT TAMBOUR

Have you seen the statue of the Little **Drummer Boy in Le Boulou?** This statue. by sculptor Gérard Vié, represents the first child to die for his motherland on November 1st, 1794, during the battle of Le Boulou (30 April-1 May 1794).

This French victory in the eastern Pyrenees was fought against the Spanish who came close to conquering Perpignan but were obliged to retreat to the Tech River.

There are 8 volumes so it should keep you going for summer!

LITTLE MONEY STREET...FERNANDA EBERSTADT

An insight into gypsies and their music in Perpignan, centring around the gypsy band Tekameli. In 1998, Fernanda Eberstadt, her husband, and their two small children moved from New York to the Quartier Saint Jacques in Perpignan. Here she found a jealously quarded culture, a society made, in part, of lawlessness and defiance of non-Gypsy norms, and met Moïse Espinas, the lead singer of the Gypsy band, Tekameli.

ALBUM OF EXILE....THÉRÈSE CAU

Thérèse Cau, daughter of Spanish Republicans and native of Port Vendres, recounts the tumultuous history of her family, from their origins in Catalonia to their lives in France today. It is the story of family divided, the experiences of her father and uncles on the frontline of the Spanish Civil War, in the internment camps in France, the struggle to reconstruct their lives in a new land where they did not speak the language.

LE LYCAN BLANG...PHIL BECKER

Test your French in this heroic-fantasy that takes place in Catalonia, following an albino werewolf, Corcinos, in a alternative XII century. All the fantasy archetypes are present: wizards, chivalry, fantastic creatures such as werewolves, minotaurs and titans... but the beauty of this fantasy is that it takes place around the Canigo, Perpignan, and Collioure!

Raised on the Mount Canigo, follow the werewolf on his journey to discover how he became a monster.

CÔTE VERMEILLE STORIES..... ELLEN TURNER HALL

Carefully crafted prose exploring characters who, like the author, have fallen under the spell of one or other of the four villages of the Côte Vermeille.

Their stories, twist and turn, basking in and buffeted by the eccentric charms of Catalonia's rocky coast as Ellen guides the reader on a voyage of discovery along the Côte Vermeille.

A WORLDLY TALE TOLD OF MOTHY CHAMBERS....

Of great interest to those who know and love KATE BARNWELL Collioure, Mothy Chambers is a sixteen year old schoolboy in England in the sixties, who is packed off by his indifferent family to learn French in Collioure, where he meets Bette, a recently married, mesmeric young woman. Ten years later, he returns to Collioure.

DAUGHTER OF CATALONIA...

In war-torn France, charismatic Spaniard Luis elopes with high-born Elise from Paris and takes her to live in a small village in Catalonia. Little do they know that war will rip them apart. Many years later their daughter Madeleine returns to France to seek out her roots and the truth of her parents' story. The town of Vermeilla is fictional but the central characters visit Collioure, Port Vendres, Amélie-les-Bains, the Vallespir and Céret.

Well researched, a gripping summer read.

LOVE AND WAR IN THE PYRENEES...

It was a tattered pair of roped soled espadrilles hanging in the St Laurent museum that initially sparked Rosemary's curiosity. They had belonged to one of the men who helped the refugees escaping Franco's forces at the end of the Spanish Civil War and now she felt an immediate need to know more of the recent history of her adopted second **home.** The resulting book uncovers love, brutality and conflicting loyalties of war. A brilliantly written record of a dark period in the history of the **Pyrenees Orientales**

SHEPHERD'S PRAYER ...KATJA WILLEMSEN

Having run from a marriage proposal in London to the history-steeped Pyrenees, Raisin Radcliffe is visited by her estranged brother, Geoffrey. Together, they explore the labyrinthine caves in the scenic hills behind Collioure, and the secrets of their traumatic childhood begin to unravel before them, with shocking consequences.

Many of the locations are real and can be explored.

COMINGS AND GOINGS IN CÉRET...

JULIE ROUSSEL CROS & LAETITIA ROUSSEL

Two sisters, having fallen under the charm of the Vallespir capital, transport the reader back to XVII century Céret. Follow Matthieu Barbet, a Parisian police officer brought to Céret to investigate poisoned bonnets. Discover the town as it was back in 1673. Those in the know will also enjoy recognising local references such as the magnificent Canigou, Perpignan, Le Boulou, the Fontaine des Neuf Jets, le pont du Diable, les bruixas

CORREFOCS

If you're out and about in Catalonia this summer, there's a good chance that you'll be treated to a Correfoc display. Their meaning of "fire runs" says it all as the 'colles de diables' (groups of 'devils') dance amongst the crowds waving sparklers, firecrackers, and roman candles, spitting fire into the crowd. The 'Generalitat de Catalunya' suggests "If by any chance your clothing catches fire, throw yourself on the ground and roll over to put out the flames. Above all, do not run, as this will spread the flames and make them burn more fiercely."




This traditional Catalonian circle dance, believed to be of Greek origin, is designed to bring whole villages together. Circles within circles, hands raised and joined together, small, precise steps..... but don't be fooled. This 'hokey cokey' style dance requires effort, muscle control and coordination. Music for the sardane is played by a 'cobla', a wind band with double bass including typical Catalan instruments tenora, tible, flabiol and tamborí, alongside trumpet, trombone, fiscorns and double bass





CASTELLS

Castells (Catalan for castles) originated at the end of the 18th century in Valls, Tarragona, when rival "colles" (groups) began to compete in constructing human towers. These castellers (castle-makers), wear traditional Catalan costume and climb on to each others shoulders to create a human pyramid, sometimes up to eight or nine storeys high, usually topped off with a brave child, a bit like a cherry on a cake!!

CREEPERS & CRAWLERS

TICK

April is the worst month for ticks, but they're still around in the summer. The one below looks flat because it hasn't fed yet. They love long grass - crawling up stems and waiting for a victim to brush past. But they also sometimes drop out of trees when they sense a warm body below. Although their bite isn't usually painful or itchy, some ticks transmit dangerous diseases to humans and dogs.



YELLOW SCORPION (SCORPION LANGUEDOCIEN)

Uncommon, but if you are unlucky enough to get stung on the toe, it will swell up and - so we understand - turn blue! But don't panic - you're not going to die.

The PO also has the

BLACK SCORPION

(SCORPION NOIR A QUEUE JAUNE) but its sting is not venomous. They lurk in dark, damp places in old buildings and if disturbed will try to scurry away.

MEGARIAN BANDED CENTIPEDE

It's big, fast and aggressive, grows up to 20cm long, and scuttles out from under leaf litter and flat stones at night. It will attack and consume almost any creature... smaller than itself. Phew. But stand on one in bare feet at your peril. Its defensive bite won't kill you, but the pain will be severe for about 15 minutes. It's another rarity though.

BLACK WIDOW SPIDER

(L'ARAIGNÉE VEUVE NOIRE)

This small spider lives in dark places in caves, under bushes and stones. Hairy, black, with little red spots, and highly venomous, but not deadly. Nevertheless. medical advice is to get to a doctor if you are bitten, because you will be in pain and feel ill

for three or four days. It's rare, however – a little more common in Corsica and Provence than in the P-O.

SOCIAL WASP (GUÊPE COMMUNE)

Anti-social might be a better name. as out of all the wasps, these are the real baddies, deserving of ASBOs. They will defend their nests (as bees will defend their hives) aggressively... and did you know that when a wasp or bee stings, a pheromone is released, attracting all the rest to wade



So there's no need to swat them!

The MUD-DAUBER **PELOPEE MACONNE** is one of them:



PAPER WASPS (GUÊPES CARTONNIÈRES OR POLISTES)

look very similar but generally form smaller colonies & build smaller nests.



There are other much bigger – and often scarierlooking – wasps in the PO, but they are solitary, not aggressive and more interested in hunting spiders than attacking us or our barbecued spare ribs.

EUROPEAN HORNET (FRELON EUROPÉEN)

They're big - especially queens, which can measure up to 35mm. They usually mind their own business and are far less bothersome than social wasps above. But if angered, they can sting any number of times.



THE ASIAN HORNET (FRELON ASIATIOUE)

Orange face and legs, they are more interested in attacking bees than us, and can destroy a whole hive, but they will still sting in defence or if angered.



These build impressive spherical nests too. usually near the tops of trees but sometimes in hedges. Poke one at your peril!

All wasps & hornets (apart from non-native Asian species) play an important part in the eco system so it's best not to kill them if possible.

WOOL CARDER BEES (ABEILLES COTONNIÈRES)

On the other hand, look very wasplike but are only aggressive towards one another. And then it's usually the males territorially quarding flowers for a female to feed or gather soft plant fibres (hence "wool carder") to line her nest.



TIGER MOSQUITO

These unpleasant devils, identifiable by their black and white markings are different from the common mozzie in that they fly and attack during the day as well as night, and their stinger is able to pierce clothing! Keep yourself covered up or sprayed with repellent (available at all supermarkets and pharmacies). More scarce at the coast, where there is less vegetation and stagnant water to breed in.

HORSEFLY (TAON BRUANT)

Found mainly in wooded areas during hot. humid weather, anything warm blooded is dinner as far as these gals are concerned - the boys only suck nectar, not blood. They're not that big: you don't hear them coming and don't feel them land. They flatten themselves on you, keep a tight grip, don't fly away when you bat at them, and are surprisingly hard to squash after you've picked them off. Their bite itches like hell.

SLIPPERY CUSTOMERS

ADDER

(VIPÈRE ASPIC)

This snake is distinctive by the triangular shape of its head, zigzag pattern on its back and vertical pupils (if you get close enough to look into its eyes!). Up to 50-60cm long, they like wooded and rough, stony ground. Their bite and venom are painful, causing skin to swell and turn blue around the site itself. If bruising appears elsewhere on the body within 6 – 8 hours, advice is to get to a hospital for an anti-venom injection.

The longest snakes that might cross your garden path are totally harmless **GRASS SNAKES** (COULEUVRES), like this one (note its round pupil):



SLIPPERY CUSTOMERS



WEEVER FISH

Its English name makes it sound innocuous. while the French "vive" reflects the level of pain inflicted by its poisonous dorsal spine: Intense. They like to partially bury themselves in sand, often near beaches, leaving just their eyes and the tip of the first dorsal fin exposed. They're not deliberately out to get you but don't appreciate being stood upon and will punish you severely. The acute pain is said to last around 20 minutes. Although the venom itself isn't considered lethal, there's a danger the agony could cause drowning. Anti-inflammatory tablets should help and heat is said to reduce the agony of Vive venom. It's best to soak your stung foot in water as hot as you can bear without scalding (with a little bleach added as disinfectant).



MOON JELLYFISH

Not all jellyfish sting, but this common species does have filaments under its bell that irritate skin, causing a burning sensation. Again, the main danger here is that a swimmer might panic and risk drowning. Although reputedly less painful than a Vive fish sting, it will be very unpleasant for at least ten minutes. Anyone with sensitive skin may suffer for several hours. For jellyfish stings the recommendation is to soak the affected area in alkaline water or vinegar.

IF YOU ARE STUNG BY ANYTHING IN THE SEA, GET OUT OF THE WATER ASAP!

WARNING: We can't vouch for any suggested treatments. Some people – especially children – may react more severely than others to stings and bites. If in doubt or if the wound shows signs of infection, seek medical advice.

BARCELONAUS Beautitu

arcelona is beautiful, many P-0 visitors start or end their holiday at the busy El Prat airport....but like any big city, it's a hotspot for street crime. Crooks and scammers stalk the streets, and public transport constantly on the lookout for new and inventive ways of relieving tourists of their valuables. In particular, they target tourists, usually relaxed and feeling mellow, putting them right at the top of the hit-list of potential victims.

OUR THANKS TO READERS FOR SHARING THEIR EXPERIENCES

"In Barcelona airport we were distracted for no longer than **20 seconds** as we picked up our keys in the hire car compound. In that time some of our smaller cases including my wife's handbag were stolen. Not a nice start to a holiday.

"Barcelona is such a stunningly beautiful city I regret having to pass on this warning. Friends (a young couple – the man tall and well built - not obvious choice for victims) report that within a five day break in Barcelona last week **they were targeted** no fewer than 3 times by trios of street robbers. They had been warned to carry nothing of value but this did not stop the gangs blatantly approaching and – for example – **simply** going through the man's pockets as he had his hands full carrying a baby and stroller up metro escalator.

"My 19 year old daughter was a victim of a purse snatcher on a recent visit to Barça. She had been careful all day but got her purse out to pay for some fruit and had it snatched from her hand. Be careful out there!

Unfortunately, Spanish law classes any theft worth less than €400 as a 'falta', a misdemeanour, rather than a 'delito' or crime, resulting in such a very small fine if caught, the same each time, that it is no deterrent!

'A common scam on the streets of Barcelona is where a voung man comes up to you and asks for directions to a popular landmark. He is followed by 2 or 3 men who flash police ID cards. "Do you know this person?" they ask "He is wanted for drug smuggling/fraud/burglary..... You may be a material witness. Can we see some ID?" You take your wallet out of your pocket/ bag..... and the rest is easy!



"Some friends stopped for a drink at a motorway services near Girona. When they set off again, they discovered they had a puncture. A helpful chap stopped and helped them change the wheel. He also helped himself to their money, credit cards and passports."

"As we were walking in Barcelona, a thief cut through the straps of my handbag with large

- stop to give directions, answer gueries....
- have maps on display inside the car clearly identifying you as a tourist
- assume that any 'official' approaching you is genuine.
- carry more than the bare minimum around with you. Leave passports, money, credit cards locked in your hotel. Take photocopies if you have to. Use a money belt.
- stop (unless driving is dangerous) for a flat tyre until you find somewhere safe (eq a police station!)



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



FINDING A GOOD IMMO (ESTATE AGENT)

Buying or selling property probably involves dealing with the largest amount of money you are ever likely to handle, so you need to get it right!

Caroline Oliver of Trilles Immobilier gives us some tips, checks and questions to ask to find the right agent.

Every Immobilier or Estate agency must be registered with the Chambre de Commerce and hold a Carte Professionnelle. Ask to see this card and check it is in date. A good agent will be carrying this card with them on visits and estimations.

They will also be affiliated with someone like the FNAIM - Federation Nationale de Immobilier. Make sure that the Agency has professional Insurance which should be clearly visible in the shops.

This is obligatory in all cases.

Look them up on Google or Meilleur Agent (Best Agent). If they don't have a good score, think twice before using them.

SO HERE'S A WEIRD ONE.

Did you know that until recently, it was illegal for people who wear prescription glasses to drive in Spain without a spare pair in the car?

Have you been incorrectly taxed by French income tax? What can you do about it?

- Check your tax declaration and make sure that the error is not yours.
- Pop into your local tax office and discuss it face to face.
- Submit a 'réclamation' (complaint) on line by logging in to your account and clicking on 'Effectuer une démarche
 - > faire une réclamation
 - > réclamation sur l'impôt sur le revenu'.

If you dont wish to make your claim on line, you can write directly to the address at the top of your tax form.

THE EASY WAY TO PROVE WHERE YOU LIVE

If you've done almost anything official in France, you'll know that they always ask for a 'justificatif de domicile' (proof of address), such as a recent utility bill.

Well, now you can sign up to Justif'Adresse, a government approved scheme, which allows officials to automatically verify your address without the hassle. Check it out at https://passeport.ants.gouv.fr/aide-etcontact/justif-adresse

PETROL STATION SECURITY

Card cloning in self service petrol stations is on the up, and French police are asking drivers to be vigilant and to contact them on 17 (do not approach the person or people concerned) if any unusual activity around the pumps is witnessed.

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
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
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
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
